Definition: Classroom Culture ...

... refers to the overall atmosphere and social dynamics within a language learning environment, encompassing aspects like student-teacher interactions, peer collaboration, respect for diverse backgrounds, and a shared sense of purpose. To actively engage in language learning, where culture is often integrated to enhance understanding and communication competence.



Freedom of expression


A supportive environment where students feel comfortable speaking and making mistakes is essential for language development.

How to cultivate a positive classroom culture in ELT

Get to know your students
Take time to learn about their cultural backgrounds, interests, and learning styles to personalize instruction

Integrate cultural content
Incorporate authentic materials and discussions about the target culture into lessons.

How to cultivate a positive classroom culture in ELT cont.

Facilitate peer interaction

Design activities that encourage students to interact with each other and learn from one another.

Use positive reinforcement

Acknowledge and praise students' efforts and achievements regularly.

Some Class practice on classroom culture

Creating Class Rules Together

Students help set classroom rules

- Rules for speaking, listening and teamwork
- Builds ownership and discipline
- Skills Writing and Speaking

Group Story Building

Students create a story together

- Each learner adds one sentence
- Encourages teamwork and creativity
- Skills: Grammar, Vocabulary, Writing & Speaking

Some Class practice on classroom culture cont.

Classroom Debate

Class divided into two opposing teams

- Students defend different viewpoints
- Encourages critical thinking
- Skills: Speaking and Vocabulary

Peer Feedback on Writing

Students exchange written work

- Check grammar, punctuation and ideas
- Builds trust and supportive culture
- Skills Writing and Editing





