

Aminat has fifteen years of experience teaching English language and Literature-in-English to high school students in the Ministry of Education.





Challenges students face in ESL classes



Challenges of Learners in ESL classes


The teacher continues to spin his/her wheel, if these challenges are not well managed

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Components of Motivation




How do you know if learners are motivated?

- They pay attention

In addition,

- They do not seek to distract others
- They are eager to submit assignments
- They exhibit positive reactions to assessment
- They cooperate, participate and remain active throughout the lesson




Components of Motivation

- Motivation is not just the ability to arouse the interest of learners, it entails sustaining it until the end and making them look forward to another class
- Unarguably, a number of components have to be put in place to achieve this



The teacher is however the one to coordinate all other components, in order to achieve the best outcome.



The Teacher

- Be enthusiastic, goal driven and motivated.
- Have a good mastery of the subject
- Ready to deploy different strategies to make the class engaging.
- Be up to date
- Be empathetic towards learners and be observant enough, to know when any learner is not motivated
- Deploy varieties of assessment procedures that yield positive results
- Think about the needs of the learners and how they might learn



Content

The content should be:

- relatable to real life
- be age appropriate
- be creative and relevant to students' experience
- should be up to date



Method

- Diverse method, particularly an engaging style
- Warm up activities that make students mentally alert
- Guided discussion
- Games
- Story telling
- Incentives
- Use of humour not sarcasm



Environment

- Fascinating arrangement
- Flexible seating
- Safe and comfortable
- Team spirited
- Promote feedback




Learners

- Intrinsically motivated
- Sense of belonging
- Perceived progress and success



Strategies to Motivate Learners



Strategies to Motivate Learners

Interest Arousal Strategies

- Use creative introduction e.g.
 Introduce your topic with a puzzle or teaser
- Use warmers and ice breakers
- Set learning objectives with learners
- Exhibit enthusiasm



Attention Retention Strategies

- Connecting language learning to students' interest
- setting up healthy competition as learning progresses
- Utilising technology and media resources
- Promoting peer mentoring, group work and project work




Beyond lesson Delivery

- Assessing learners with empathy
- De-emphasising grades and celebrating progress and achievements
- Giving creative homework



Practical Classroom Applications



Practical Classroom Applications

Grammar

- Don't just make them memorize rules use a communicative approach
- Put answers in cross word puzzles, e.g. synonyms and antonyms
- Use songs
- Give lively tasks



Speech work

- Acknowledge cultural background differences
- Encourage learners to speak out
- Make it fun and creative e.g. use audio visuals
- Avoid excessive corrections
- Boost their confidence



Writing

- Give age-appropriate tasks
- Don't be too quick to guide
- Allow for progression
- Celebrate learners' progress and achievement
- Encourage peer assessment.
- Use guided discussion



Comprehension and vocabulary development

- Be the first to read
- Relate content to real life experience
- Get creative
- Encourage group discussion
- Drill as learners read



Literature in English

- Relate content to learners' experience
- Encourage collaborative reading
- Get creative
- Let them see the plays ,watch novels that have been adapted into film
- If possible, move from text to tech. For example, ask learners to make a video on their favourite character or better still, on given character
- Invite an author to the classroom
