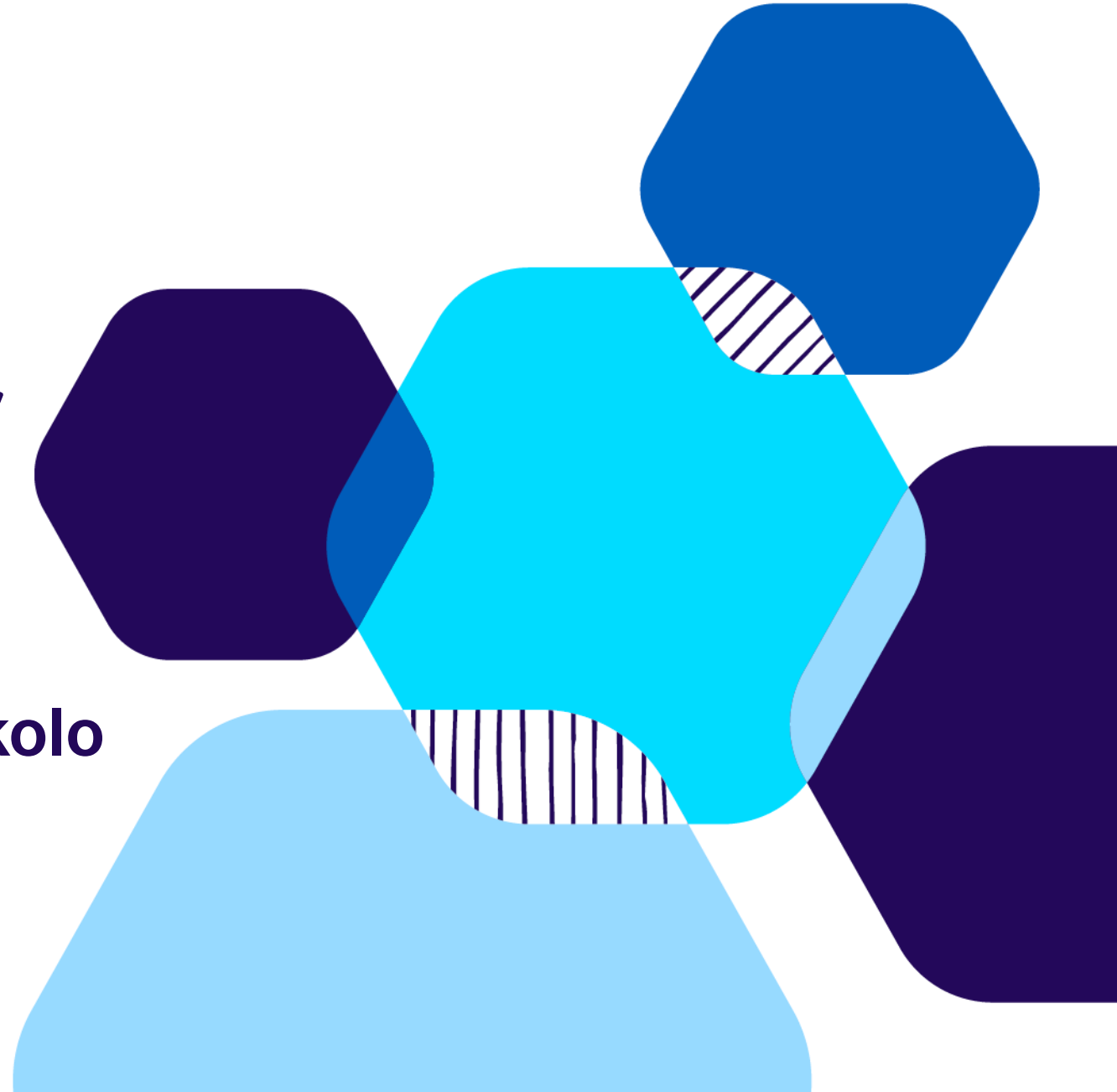

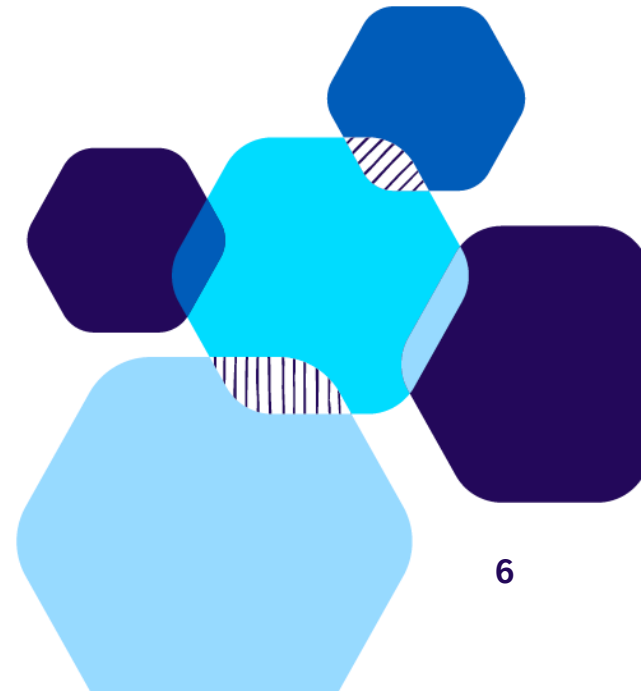

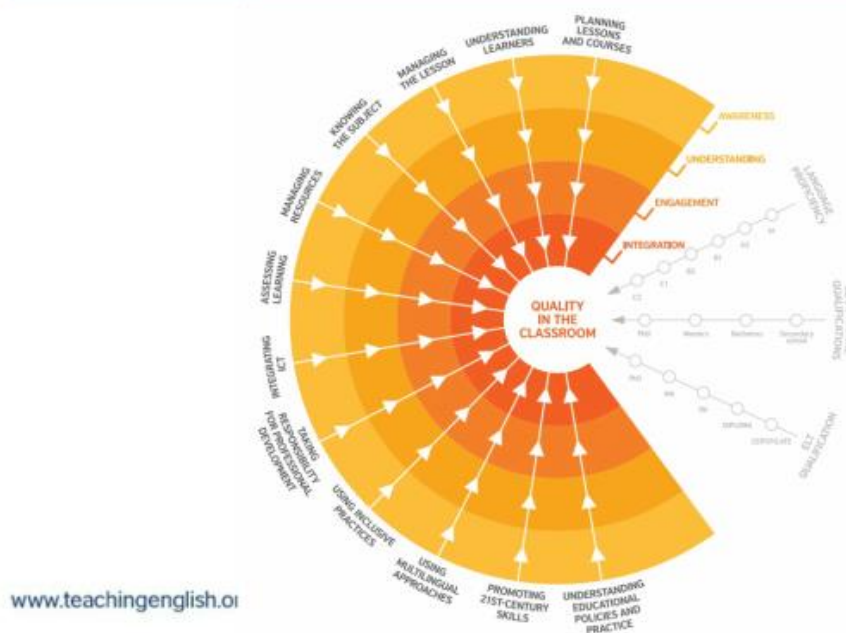
British Council CPD Framework

Strategies for TR4PD

Workshops/Seminars

An “intensive short-term learning activity that is designed to provide an opportunity to acquire specific knowledge and skills”.

(Richards & Farrell, 2005, p.23)



MOOCs

Massive: Accommodates a large number of students.

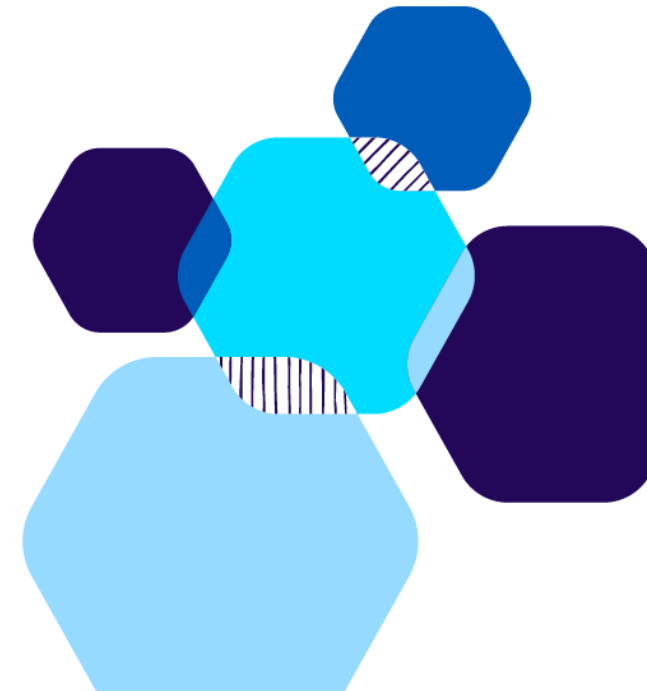
Open: Open to anyone with an internet connection.

Online: delivered mostly online through LMS

Courses: Are structured like traditional university courses, with a syllabus, lectures, assignment and assessment.

Eg. TeachingEnglish / Coursera / Udemy / FutureLearn

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Strategies for TR4PD (cont.)

Using Technology

Social media, mobile, television, WhatsApp and internet “internet bandwidth and mobile technology are gradually becoming prevalent and less expensive” (Lightfoot, 2019, p.56)

Professional Networks and Communities:

“explore their own contexts, construct knowledge and understanding of what takes place in their classroom” (Richards & Farrell, 2005, p.13)



Strategies for TR4PD (cont.)

Video Enhanced Observations

- Teachers record their lessons with a camera
- Teachers review video recording and reflecting on their strengths and areas of improvement
- Colleagues/mentors review recording and provide feedback
- Collaborative discussions for improvement.



Peer Observation

A professional development process where teachers observe and provide feedback on each other's teaching practices.



Strategies for TR4PD (cont.)

Reflective Practice

A process of thoughtfully considering one's teaching experiences, actions, and decisions to learn from them and improve future performances.

Leads to self awareness, more thoughtful and intentional approach to teaching, critical thinking, feedback and action planning.

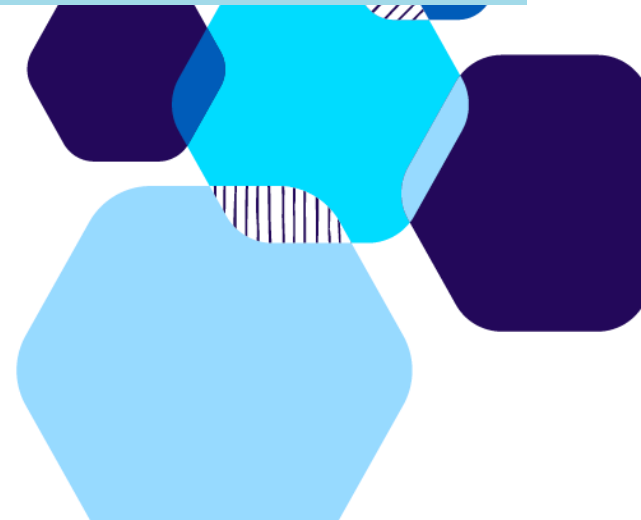
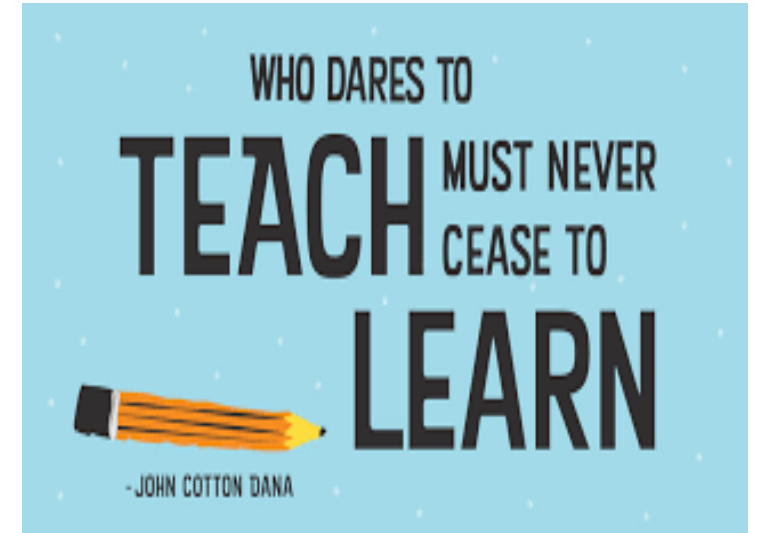
Action Plan

Objective	Action/ Steps	Timeline	Resources
Improve technology integration	Attend workshops and trainings/collaborate with colleagues	6 months	Workshops, watch Videos, collaborate with colleagues.
Effective classroom management	Read books, Observe a colleague, develop a personalised classroom management plan	3 months	Watch teaching videos, observe a colleague, read articles
